Born in New York, the jeweller Diane Kordas has called London her home since 1995. Yet for the past 15 years, her heart has belonged in Mykonos, where she has built a relaxed home with her husband, Steve, who was born in Greece, and their two grown-up daughters. Diane first visited the island aged 18 with Steve. "Every summer, we travelled to Greece together, and on one of those trips, he took me to Mykonos. I loved the fact that it was so barren and then there was the big blue. It was so different from where I grew up in New Jersey."

Two daughters and many family holidays on the island later, she received a call from a friend. "He said there was this great piece of land for sale with incredible views, but we'd have to jump on it. The girls were nine and five, and we wanted somewhere the family could spend time together. Steve got on a plane and signed the deal before I'd even seen it."

The couple set to work, with their friend and interior designer Hubert Zandberg, to create a light, elegant yet functional space that's filled with personality. (Diane describes Steve as a frustrated architect — in fact he studied engineering at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and now works in finance.) Inspired by the era when Jackie Onassis, Liz Taylor and Sophia Loren holidayed in Greece, the couple wanted to blend the house's location with their own style. "Yes, it had to be a family home, but we also wanted it to reflect our taste," she says. "I loved the period in the 1960s and 1970s when Hollywood stars came here."

What they built was exactly as she intended. "We wanted a place where the girls would come to be with us, long after they were grown-up. With busy lives, our holidays with them are so precious. It's the one place where nobody is working, so it's all about 'Where are we having dinner?', 'When should we go swimming?', 'Shall we go to the beach?'" ■
